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# NOTES ON PROSPECTING REPORT - CUB GROUP MINERAL CLAIMS

During 1973 systematic prospecting was carried out on the Cub Mineral Claims. This program was conducted with the following objectives.

- 1. To relocate and examine known gold-bearing quartz veins in the area. (See under "History" below.)
- 2. To check anomalies found in a previous geochemical survey and look for mineralization in nearby outcrops that would account for these anomalies.
- 3. To further investigate the possibilities of a lafge, low-grade ore-body occurring in the area.

## Claims and Title

Golden Hinde Mines Ltd. (N.P.L.) holds 14 contiguous mineral claims in the group. Attached is a tabulation marked Appendix "C" with data pertaining to these claims. Also attached is a photocopy of a section of Map 92F/5E (M) showing the claims in relation to other claims in the area, marked Appendix "D" and a map on the scale of 1" to 1500' marked Appendix "B" which shows an outline of the claim group and areas where work was carried out.

## Location and Access

The claims cover the area drained by Dry Creek and the lower part of the valley of Noble Creek. Both these streams are tributaries on the northwest side of Bedwell River about 6 miles inland from tidewater at the head of Bedwell Sound. Access is by means of trails branching from the main Bedwell River road, which is an improved logging road lodated over the old Department of Mines access road originally constructed previous to 1914.

#### History

Bedwell River is among the oldest known mining areas in British Columbia. Placer gold was discovered here in the 1860's and Chinese placer miners were active in the area until around 1889 and were reported to have had a settlement consisting of several cabins near the mouth of Noble Creek. Lode gold and copper prospects were first located in the area around the turn of the century. Some of these are still held as Crown grants. The Cub claims represent a re-location of some of these old prospects. The most comprehensive report on the area is B. C. Department of Nines Bullifin #8 by H. Sargent, published in 1940. This report mentions narrow quartz veins on Noble Creek and disseminated

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mineralization on Dry Creek. These are areas covered by the Cub claims.

## Mineralization

Maps marked Appendix "E" and Appendix "F" outline the areas traversed. Appendix "E" covers the Noble Creek section on a scale of 1" to 100° and Appendix "F" the Dry Creek section on a scale of 1" to 200°. Some of the narrow quartz veins mentioned in Bullitin "8 are shown in the Noble Creek section. One other was found just north of the area mapped. It is proposed that this will be mapped in a supplementary report to follow at a later date. The stock-work of quartz veins and disseminated mineralization mentioned by Sargent is shown above the northerly fork of Dry Creek. Some indications of disseminated mineralization that could be tied in with geochemical anomalies in gold, silver, copper and molybdenum were also found south-west and north-wast of Dry Creek indicating a large area of low-grade mineralization in this area.

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

SCALE linch = 136 Miles


