


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INTRODUCTION

Historically the Rossland camp has been a significant mining area from the mid 1890's to the late 1920's, during which time some five million tons of ore were mined, which at todays prices would approach a gross value exceeding two billion dollars. Much of this production centered around the War Eagle, Le Roi and the Centre Star crown granted claims which gave the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company its beginning and the springboard into its position today.

Although these claims were the centre of the activity and the locus of the camp being one of the major gold producers in B..C. there were numerous other satellite properties that contributed to the total production.

Some of these satellite properties continued activity well after the cessation of operations in the Rossland camp by the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company. During the 1930's many leasers worked the properties and activity has continued on a sporadic basis since then.

This writer has been involved in mining on the Blue Bird crown grant claim from 1972 to 1976, and has spent much time reviewing the data on the camp as well as prospecting much of the area.

The four claims covered in this report, the Sunbeam Frn. Lot 5008

Black Diamond Lot Illl, Union Jack Lot 1288 and the Poor Property Lot 1273

are held in the name of D.K. Bragg by application dated May 27, 1980.

One of the problems in working many of these old crown granted mineral claims in the Rossland camp is finding the old survey pins and establishing the claim boundaries in the field. It would appear from work done to date in the area of the old rail grade about one mile south of the city of Rossland that the crown granted claims are missplotted by approximately 750 feet to the east on the departmental claims map. This has resulted in some confusion and conflict when located mineral claims are then plotted on the map relative to topography.

The intent of this investigation was to try to find the lot survey pins and thus establish the claim boundaries in the field and to map in any mineral showings that were found along with any old workings on the four claims.

To assist in this the old survey plans were obtained for each claim. We were also able to find some of the old mineral maps of the Rossland camp dating back to the early I920's that gives a fairly accurate plot of the claims relative to the topography.

ŒOLOGY


The Rossland area is underlain by sedimentary and volcanic rocks which have been intruded and metamorphosed by igneous rocks (see GSC Memoir 308 by L.W. Little).

The oldest formation is the Mount Roberts Formation (Pennsylvanian) which are sediments consisting of slates, limestones, quartzites and greenstones (andesites and banded tuffs).

This in turn is overlain by the Rossland Formation (Lower Jurassic) which consists mainly of lava flows of andesitic to basaltic composition, augite porphry, and bodies of tuff and argillite.

The above rocks have been intruded by at least five different intrusions of lower Cretaceous to Tertiary ages.

Most of all these formations have been subjected to faulting and the intrusion of numerous dykes of various composition from monzonites to basalts. In general these dykes are steeply dipping and trend to the north. In the area to the south and south east of Rossland there are at least two fractures or faults along which mineralized stopes are formed. The Mayflower Blue Bird vein, system can be traced for at least I200 meters while the Homestake vein system has been traced for over a length of 2200 metres, although it is not known for certain that this is a continuous system. There are numerous other short fractures along which mineralization has been found.

The Sunbeam Frm. comprising of IO.54 acres was Crown Granted on Jan. I4, I902 by Thomas Lapslie. There is little evidence of any work having been done on the property, although in I913 it was grouped along with the Richmond, Hattie, Lily May, Black Horse, Dew Drop Frm. and the Alice D Frm. Some work was done on surface cuts but most of the work during this period was done on the Lily May.

PROPERTY LOCATION AND ACCESSIBILITY


The Sunbeam Frn. is two and one half kilometers South of the City of Rossland and is accessible by road through Drakes farm. A power transmission line crosses the northern section of the claim.


FIELD WORK

On the 22 nd day of May the property was visited by D. K. Bragg and E. S. Warner to prospect and try to deliniate the boundaries of the Sunbeam Frm. and to map in any showings relative to the claim.


RESULTS

A map of the area, on the scale of I to IOOO, had been drafted from the old survey plans. During a preliminary search of the area for the survey pins we were able to find only one pin, that being the point of the intersection of the west boundary of S L I78 with the east boundary of the Lily May crown grant Lot IO52. With this information, along with the material of the original survey notes, we were able to position ourselves. A line was then run eastward to the Sunbeam Frn. Lot 5008 and a line thence run south through the centre of the claim, with lines run to positions where we though that other survey pins should exhist. A search around these positions failed to turn up any other pins.

The Black Diamond Lot Inhh was crown granted on Aug. 24th, 1898 by

J. S. Colton Fox and C. Sweeney. It comprises of 30.25 acres. There are no records

of any work having been done on this claim.

PROPERTY LOCATION AND ACCESSIBILITY

The Black Diamond claim lies two and one half kilometers south, south west of the city of Rossland and is accessible by road through Drakes farm.


FIELD WORK


On the 23rd day of May 1982 the property was visited by D. K. Bragg and E. S. Warner to prospect and to try to deliniate the boundaries of the Black Diamond claim and to map in any showings.


RESULTS

A preliminary search for survey pins in an area of a radius of a hundred metres of the north west corner of the Lily May C.G. where the boundaries of the Hattie Lot Io54, Richmond Lot Io58, Lily May Lot IO52 and Black Horse Lot IO59 intersect the boundaries of the Black Diamond Lot Ihhl failed to turn up any survey pins. A line was then run 500 metres westward from the eastern boundary of the Lily May C.G. where it is intersected by S.L. I78. From thence a line was run 40 Metres S 25° E to the south west corner of the Black Diamond claim, and 500 metres N 25° W to the north west corner of the claim. A search of these two positions failed to turn up the survey pins.

The Union Jack claim was crown granted on April 6, 1897 by L. H. Merrill.

It comprises of 47.30 acres. No other records or references of work having been done on the property could be found.

PROPERTY LOCATION AND ACCESSIBILITM


The Union Jack claim lies three kilometers west south west of the City of Rossland. The highway between Rossland and Paterson runs through the claim.


FIELD WORK

On the 24 day of May I982 the property was visited by D. K. Bragg and E. S. Warner to prospect and to try to deliniate the boundaries of the Union Jack claim and to map any showings that were found.

RESULTS

A map of the area of the Union Jack Lot I288 and the Poor Property Lot I273 had been prepared on a scale of I - I000 from the old survey notes. A preliminary search for the survey pins failed to turn up any. It was then decided to map the old rail grade and roads in an attempt to position the claims from the information obtained from the old survey notes and maps. Once this was done and the claims positioned relative to the mapping of the rail grade and roads as best that we could we then run lines to where we expected the lot corners to be. Still a search of these areas failed to turn up any pins.






PLAN

The Poor Property Lot I273 was first crown granted on Sept 24, I897 by J. Quilliam and H. S. Wadsworth. It appears that the claim was allowed to revert to the crown since it was subsequently crown granted again on Oct. 25, I92I by S. G. Blaylock. The claim comprises of 50.45 acres. No other records or references of work having been done on the property could be found.

PROPERTY LOCATION AND ACCESSIBILITY


The Poor Property claim lies three and a half kilometers south west of the City of Rossland. The highway between Rossland and Paterson runs through the western half of the claim.


FIELD MORK


RESULTS

A map of the area of the Union Jack Lot I238 and the Poor Property Lot I273 had been prepared on a scale of I - I000 from the old survey notes. A preliminary search for the survey pins failed to turn up any. It was then decided to map the old rail grade and roads in an attempt to position the claims from the information obtained from the old survey notes and maps. Once this was done and the claims positioned relative to the mapping of the rail grade and roads as best as we could we then run lines to where we expected the lot corners to be. Still a search of these areas failed to turn up any pins.

CONCLUSIONS

From the work that has been done to date in the Rossland Camp it would appear that few of the survey pins have survived. Much of the area has been culturally modified by logging, farming plus road, power line and gas line right of ways, where the pins have been disturbed and lost. Also in some cases matal pins appear not to have been used and many of the wooden monuments have rotted beyond recognition. However in some areas there have been some more recent re-surveying and more of the survey pins have survived. In order to re establish the boundaries and the position of the crown grants it may be necessary to re-survey the claims in.
